We honor 100 years of women's suffrage in Germany while also celebrating the 100th anniversary of passing the 19th Amendment in U.S. Congress on June 4, 1919. The first part of the exhibition depicts the difficult path women faced on their way to obtaining suffrage in the U.S. and highlights significant historic moments and leading female figures in U.S. politics and law. You further receive information on gender equality as we feature quotes, infographics, and statistics about issues such as gender discrimination, the wage gap, and access to education. A central part of our exhibition is dedicated to female trailblazers, who paved the way for women's rights and equality as lawyers, judges and politicians, including the four female U.S. Supreme Court Justices who have served or are still serving on the high court.

THE (REALLY) LONG MARCH THROUGH THE INSTITUTIONS: WHY 100 YEARS OF U.S. FEMALE SUFFRAGE ISN'T ENOUGH LECTURE & DISCUSSION WITH PROF. JOYCE MUSHABEN, PHD, UNIVERSITY OF MISSOURI-ST. LOUIS

This talk addresses "the lessons learned" across three waves of feminism in the U.S. dating back to 1920, then considers what younger cohorts might do to "level the political playing field" and combat the anti-woman backlash unleashed by the Trump White House since 2017. While the 2018 midterm elections boosted women's physical presence in the halls of power, the real barriers to change are rooted in structural factors, starting with the electoral system.
